Professional Experience:

Public Policy

Served on the senior staff of the Governor of Ohio as Policy Coordinator and Executive Assistant to the Governor with policy development and implementation oversight responsibilities for the various departments of state government. Special projects included establishing conflict management programs in state government departments, including writing and guiding the passage of legislation establishing the Ohio Commission on Dispute Resolution and Conflict Management.

Consulting

Public Policy mediation and facilitation for federal, state, and local governments. Private industry collaborative management training and long-range planning. Advised and functioned as a crisis intervention mediator at the request of the various Presidents of Kent State University: Drs. White, Odds, Golding, and

Schwartz. Often these were informal and non-public duties by necessity, involving negotiations between contending factions during protest confrontations on campus. For reasons of confidentiality, reference should be made to Dr. Michael Schwartz, former President, if greater detail on this consulting role is required.

Counseling

The program of the Center for Applied Conflict Management involves both research and teaching, with a fully certified major available through the College of Arts and Sciences. As Assistant Director, Acting Director, and Director, had oversight responsibility for the counseling of all the students entering under degree-seeking status. This amounts to approximately several hundred individuals directly counseled throughout their term of residency at Kent State University.

Teaching

Taught an average of nine credit hours per term each year, as well as numerous individual investigations and field studies. Served on M.A. and Ph.D. committees for several graduate programs.

Public Outreach and Recruitment

Designed and produced numerous brochures, slide presentations, and promotional materials of many descriptions for use in departmental as well as university recruitment in general. In addition to talks and personal visits to schools, a variety of media appearances were also part of the recruitment program implemented as a representative of the Center for Applied Conflict Management.

Reviewing and Editing

Appointed Executive Editor of the journal Peace and Change, one of five major scholarly journals in the field of peace studies. The journal, which has been in existence for several decades, publishes articles on a variety of peace research topics such as militarism, conflict mediation, and historical interpretation of policy as it has affected peace in our time. Professional organization sponsors of the journal have included the Consortium on Peace research, Education and Development and the Conference on Peace Research in History.

Original Instructional Resource Development

Authored the general curriculum design for the Kent State University peace studies program as well as the later changes in that curriculum to focus on conflict resolution. Examples include the following actual course syllabi: Anatomy of Peaceful Change, Introduction to Conflict Management, Theories of Change, Concepts of Nonviolence, Strategies of Change, Personal Development. The peace studies curriculum of the Center for Peaceful Change (now the Center for Applied Conflict Management) was qualified by the Consortium on Peace Research, Education and Development as a model of one of the four major types of programs extant in the field. The Kent State model was cited in numerous articles on the development of the discipline, including the book *Peace and World Order Systems: Teaching and Research* by Wehr and Washburn (Sage Press: 1976). In addition, it should be noted that the curriculum is a fully-accredited major, having been approved by the College of Arts and Sciences, the Educational Policies Council, the Faculty Senate, the Kent State University Board of Trustees, and the Ohio Board of Regents.

Grant Proposals Obtained
